

Stable Housing for Homeless People with Substance Use Issues

Order a free copy or PDF download at www.cmhc.ca "Perhaps the most significant issues that emerges from this study is the degree of success that can be achieved with the housing first approach. The case studies in this report who that most people who are homeless, even if they have substance use issues and concurrent disorders, can be successfully housed directly from the street if they are given the right supports when they want them. If the goal is to end homelessness, the results of this study make it clear that for many people who are homeless, a "housing first" approach would make this possible.

"What is especially significant in the findings from these case studies is that if solutions can be found for this population—those with complex needs and who have the longest history of living on the streets—then perhaps key elements that distinguish the case studies, such as housing first or a client-centred approach, can be applied to address the needs of other people who are homeless—people who are newer to homelessness and who are not confronted by the multitude of problems that persons described in this report deal with on a daily basis."

"In an era when incomprehensibly complex issues like Peak Oil and Climate Change dominate headlines, practical solutions at a local level can seem somehow inadequate.


